

Megan Pulkkinen, WCN, asked me if I'd let all my readers know about the Olympic Chapter of WSNLA. The letters WCN and WCL are good letters to know about. The letters mean "Washington Certified Nursery Professional" and "Washington Certified Landscaper." You may have seen these abbreviations on the nametags of some of your favorite nursery people.

WCNs and WCLs must work 2000 hours with a licensed nursery, landscape contractor or a WSNLA approved institution. Each WCN candidate takes classes and studies a twenty-two chapter training manual covering major aspects of the nursery industry from "Introductory Botany" to "Washington Laws and Regulations." WCLs study the same materials and concentrate on soils, how plants grow, naming of plants, water and watering systems, fertilizers, plant pests and diseases, weeds and weed control, turfgrass management, pruning and laws and regulations.

The three-hour certification test is given in March and October of each year. Applicants can take a test that will grant certification as either or both a WCN or WCL. Part of the test is identification of at least 350 plants. To maintain certification, WCNs and WCLs attend additional classes every year for three years. They must also take the test again in three years. After six years of maintained certification the nursery professional or landscaper can apply for and receive lifetime certification. However, these professionals continue to hone their skills by taking classes and/or attending Washington State Nursery and Landscape Association meetings.

Our local chapter, the Olympic Chapter, of the Washington Certified Nursery and Landscape Professionals, meets the second Wednesday of each month at different nurseries and horticulture venues throughout the Olympic and Kitsap Peninsulas.

Local Landscape Designer Kate Easton is Secretary of the Olympic Chapter and George Bahr of Roadhouse Nursery is President-Elect of the State Chapter of Washington Certified Nursery and Landscape Professionals. Jan Bahr and George Bahr, Roadhouse Nursery owners, have been active and involved in the organization for years.

The rest of today's column covers miscellaneous topics. Donna Paulson has been making lots and lots of cement leaves lately. She told me about Storey Book Publishers offerings of small booklets with directions for many projects. Call 1-800-441-5700 and ask them to send you a catalogue. One of the booklets Donna ordered gives this recipe for cement leaves. The recipe we used recently was not very specific, but this one uses these quantities: one part Portland cement, three parts sand and two to three tablespoons of cement bonding adhesive per gallon of water. You can add pigment or not.

While we're talking about the cement leaves, many people have been asking about the pigment. Fred Hill and Lowe's carry pigment in shades of red, terra cotta, charcoal, brown and buff. Fred Hill can special order the green pigment but it takes about two weeks. So far Fred Hill is the only place with green pigment.

We have lots of burlap bags if anyone is still looking for them. They're one dollar each and the proceeds go to the Raab Park Youth Garden Fund and will also be set aside for the Raab Park Community Pea Patch Fund.
